### Year C - Easter John 20:1-9

The teaching of Scripture is that Jesus must rise from the dead



On Sunday morning while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance.

She ran to Simon Peter and to Jesus' favourite disciple and said, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb! We don't know where they have put him."

Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. They ran side by side, until the other disciple ran faster than Peter and got there first. He bent over and saw the strips of linen cloth lying inside the tomb, but he did not go in.

## Background for leaders

For this Gospel, there is no richer or more profound message than to simply proclaim the story itself because the events of Easter are at the heart of the Good News!

It's a bold thing to say that we believe that Jesus died and rose again on the third day, but that is exactly what we profess each time we say the Creed together! In the Catechism of the Catholic Church we read: "The Resurrection of Jesus is the crowning truth of our faith in Christ, a faith believed and lived as the central truth by the first Christian community; handed on as fundamental by Tradition; established by the documents of the New Testament; and preached as an essential part of the Paschal mystery along with the cross: Christ is risen from the dead! Dying, he conquered death; To the dead, he has given life (CCC. para. 489)

As leaders, we encourage you to look up the section in the Catechism that covers this fundamental part of our faith https://www.vatican.va/archive/ENG0015/\_INDEX.HTM (go to the section titled 'On the third day he rose from the dead' paragraphs 638 to 655). As you read it, ask the Holy Spirit to inspire you, so that you can proclaim the story of Easter to the children in your group, with faith and confidence.

In this section of the Catechism, you'll read:

- that the resurrection of Jesus was a historical event
- about the many, many witnesses to Jesus' resurrection
- that, "in his risen body [Jesus] passes from the state of death to another life beyond time and space" (with children we say, 'he is alive in a new and wonderful way').
- that all of Jesus' life and teachings was confirmed by his resurrection.
- that Jesus resurrection is the fulfilment of promises made in the Old Testament, New Testament and by Jesus himself.
- that, because of Jesus death and resurrection, we can share in God's life.
- and finally, that because of Jesus' resurrection, we can have hope that we will also live for eternity with God.

#### Message
