But I am giving you a new command. You must love each other, just as I have loved you. If you love each other, everyone will know that you are my disciples.

Introduction


- In today's gospel, Jesus gives the disciples a new commandment, to love one another.
- Love will be one of the ways that others will know that they are disciples, followers of Jesus. Why? Because Jesus that's what Jesus did, he loved others.

Message

- Jesus loved others in many ways. His love was one of the most important things about his ministry, and his death and resurrection.
- When someone chooses to be a 'disciple' it means that they choose to follow the example of Jesus, to do what he did and to live the way he taught.
- When others see the way the disciple lives and loves, they should be able to recognise that they are following Jesus example.

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Celebrating Laudato Si' Week

Introduction

Ten years ago, Pope Francis wrote a letter, called Laudato Si', to all people saying that God's love is shown through his gift of creation and it is our responsibility to care for this gift. He also explained how when people damage the earth, it is often the poorest people who suffer the most and so by caring for the earth, we are getting closer to God and looking out for each other. Caring for creation and caring for each other are interconnected and both need action so that we show respect and love for God.

Message

- In this Gospel Jesus gives us his new commandment
- A new commandment I give unto you: That you love one another, as I have loved you, that you also love one another.
- Caring for each other and for the earth is showing God's love.
- This week is Laudato Si' Week to celebrate this important letter from Pope Francis. As Catholics we celebrate this week every year and this year the theme is "Raising Hope."
