## Year A - Fifth Sunday of Lent John 11:3-7, 11, 20-27, 31-45

I am the resurrection and the life.



Martha and her sister Mary sent a message to the Lord and told him that his friend Lazarus was sick. When Jesus heard this, he said, "His sickness won't end in death. It will bring glory to God and his Son." Jesus loved Martha and her sister and brother. But he stayed where he was for two more days. Then he said to his disciples, "Now we'll go back to Judea." When Jesus got to Bethany, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. When Martha heard that Jesus had arrived, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed in the house. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. Yet even now I know that God will do anything you ask. Jesus told her, "Your brother will live again!" Martha answered, "I know that he will be raised to life on the last day, when all the dead are raised." Jesus then said, "I am the one who raises the dead to life! Everyone who has faith in me will live, even if they die. And everyone who lives because of faith in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

"Yes, Lord!" she replied. "I believe that you are Christ, the Son of God. You are the one we hoped would come into the world." Many people had come to comfort Mary, and when they saw her quickly leave the house, they thought she was going out to the tomb to cry. So they followed her. Mary went to where Jesus was. Then as soon as she saw him, she kneeled at his feet and said, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

When Jesus saw that Mary and the people with her were crying, he was terribly upset and asked, "Where have you put his body?" They replied, "Lord, come and you will see."

Jesus started crying, and the people said, "See how much he loved Lazarus." Some of them said, "He gives sight to the blind. Why couldn't he have kept Lazarus from dying?"

Jesus helps us when we are 'in a bind'!



Introduction • Jesus gives us new life when there are things that 'bind us' up.

## Message

- In the gospel, Lazarus' body is bound up, he is in the dark tomb that has been sealed.
- But Jesus loves Lazarus and his sisters, so he comes to raise Lazarus back to life and help him be free.
- Jesus told the people to 'to roll the stone away', then he shouted "Lazarus, come out!" And Lazarus, who had been dead, came out. His hands and feet were wrapped with strips of burial cloth, and a cloth covered his face. Jesus then told the people, "Untie him and let him go."

### Discussion

- · Sometimes there are things that can 'bind us up' and keep us in the 'dark' too. These can include:
- Things that worry us.
- Things we are afraid of.
- Times when we are shy.
- Temptations that get the better of us.
- Choices we keep making that hurt ourselves or others.
- Grudges that stop us from forgiving others who have hurt us.
- But the scripture today reminds us that we can ask Jesus to help us be free.
- What we have to do is:
- Notice that we are feeling 'in a bind' (have a short discussion about what this can 'feel' like depending on the situation - sensations of nervousness, feelings of guilt, disappointment
- Identify what it is that is causing us to feel 'in a bind'.
- Say a little prayer asking Jesus to help.
- With Jesus help, do the next good thing to help us be free.
