# **Year A - 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time** Matthew 5:23-24

Make Peace with others



Introduction • Today's gospel is a very short one, but it's an important one where Jesus reminds us to make peace with others when we hurt them.

### Message

- In Jesus' days, when people went to the synagogue they would take a special 'offering' (another word is 'gift') as a way of showing God their love and worship.
- In a similar way, we make a gift to God every time we go to Mass or pray.



- How do we do this?
  - By singing, praying and responding
  - By taking forward the gifts of bread and wine
- These are good things to do.
- But there are some things that can stop our gifts for God being as good and they should be.
- Especially, when we have done something to hurt another person.
- We can't give God a good gift if we have something we need to say sorry for - it just doesn't work!
- That's why Jesus is reminding us today to say 'sorry' when we need to so that our gifts to God can be truly beautiful.
- Thankfully, there is a special time in Mass when we can say 'sorry'. It's called the Penitential Rite. It's a time when we can make peace.
- It's the time when we say 'Lord have mercy', 'Christ have mercy', 'Lord have mercy'.
- The Penitential Rite helps us to say 'sorry' so that we can give a good gift to God with pure hearts as well.

## **Discussion**

- Sometimes, we don't want to say 'sorry' for things we've done that make others angry. Why do you think that is?
- When we say 'sorry' we are making an apology. What do you think makes a good apology?
- What do you think is the best way to apologise? Why?
  - Say: 'I'm sorry'
  - Say: 'Please forgive me for \_\_\_\_\_\_'
